John Knox Village East and Meyer Care Center have been an integral part of the Higginsville and area communities for many years. The umbrella campus of John

Knox Village East & Meyer Care Center have always put the well-being of their resi-dents first, which is what they plan to enhance with some major renovations that increases the comfort and convenience of residents in both neighborhoods of the The most community. noticeable change from the outside is the renovation of the grand entrance to the entire campus where guests and visitors will be greeted and directed to the appropriate location they're seeking.

Skilled Rehabilitation capabilities have been upgraded as have dining accommodations for the health center.

Meyer Care Center was the first of two buildings to be built in 1965 on land donated by George and Hilda Meyer, with the hope of later adding a hospital. The hospital vision never materialized; so, in 1975, Buildings A and B of the current John Knox Village East complex were built and Building C was completed in 1979. John

ties were developed by Dr. Rev. Kenneth Berg, a retired Presbyterian minister, and named after Knox, a Scottish Presbyterian theologian in the 1500's. JKVE is operated in partnership with Life Care Services, which has facilities in 140 communities serving over 30,000 residents across the United States. JKVE is run by locals who know their community and its citizens. Current board members are David Schmidt, president, Michelle Alumbaugh, Lee Barker, Mary Lou Buckler, Trudy Fisher, David Limback, and Jim Urfer. Kurt Lorenz is the Director of Sales and Marketing and Paige Wheeler is the cutive Director. The JKVE/MCC complex

is unique in that it is a CCRC (Continuing Care Retirement Community) which consists of Independent Living, Assisted Living, Skilled Nursing, and Rehabilitation. All levels of care are availwithin the campus. John Knox Village East is a Life Plan Community which means residents can buy in with their initial entrance fee and their monthly rate transfers to Meyer if a health issue requires a move there. "This is a significant savings in itself," Lorenz said. "An average stay in a Skilled

Cyber insurance discussed at C-1 Board meeting; enrollment lowest in at least 15 years

The C-1 Board Education met last Thursday in their regularly scheduled meeting.

Congratulations given to C-1 athletic director and softball coach for his induction into the Missouri Fastpitch High School Coaches Association on Feb.

The district's twice-yearly enorllment figures reported in January was 927 students, down from 953 last year. It's the fewest number of students in the last 15 years that were available. The previous low was last year's and the high was 1,050 of 2002-03. "Declining enrollment is a trend for rural Missouri," superintendent David Figg

Hailey Feldcamp, representing the High School Student Council, requested board permission for four students to attend the state convention Mar. 9-11 at Mehlville High School in St. Louis, which would require an overnight stay. Permission was granted.

The new course requests from the January meeting, Honors Choir and Honors Band, as well as a new one, Missouri History, were accepted for next school year's curriculum. These three classes will be available to juniors and seniors.
The 2017-18 school calen-

dar was approved. School will begin on Aug. 16 and the last day of school be May 17, with graduation on May 20. "It is comparable to this year's schedule except for an earlier Easter break, which will be a Thursday-through-Tuesday dismissal," Figg said.

Insurance presented a proposal for the district concerning the purchase of cyber insurance. "Cyber liability is relatively new. Only a few years ago were we talking about cyber breaches," Keith said. "This is somebody intruding into the district's computers for your information. Cyber extortion consists of somebody locking up your computer system and demand money to unlock it. The district would also have to notify thousands of former students and teachers that their personal information on the computers has been compromised. Insurance would pay for money paid and the expense of notifying students and teachers." The board will make a decision concerning the insurance at their next workshop on Mar. 2. At that workshopl, teachers will present a class Chromebooks, which the district is considering purchasing for students next year.
